

The Club has also been committed to ensuring that what it wishes to do is implemented.

The incomplete project for the year was the implementation of the fishing competition and recognition of women's violence as a major project. During the course of next Rotary Year, it is intended to further build on funding support for the proposed women's refuge in Bendigo and recognition of women's violence in the community.

Tasks within the club:

To insure the smooth operation of the club it was important to identify all the various tasks needed to be undertaken within the club and to recognize that all members do make a contribution to ensure all these things happen. Also within our club membership it is important that every member has an identifiable role to perform, otherwise why bother turning up each week.

Meeting Processes and Content:

Thanks to our team of sergeants, club meetings ran smoothly and mostly to time, although on occasions due to the quality of our speakers we did do a bit of overtime. Thanks to Anne, Rod and Helene we have had an action packed program. Some of our speakers during the year have included our local Federal Member Lisa Chesters, Minister for Veteran's Affairs Senator Michael Ronaldson, our Bendigo Mayor Peter Cox and the Editor of the Bendigo Advertiser Rod Case just to highlight a few. We have also included a number of speakers from various rotary committees and many of our students who have been recipients of awards.

The smooth conduct of our meetings is very much due to the great work carried out each week by Ros Chenery. Attendance numbers for the caterers are collated accurately, the duty roster is always prepared and everything we need to get the weekly meeting up and running is always in place.

Fun/Fellowship

We had some feedback from our members via the survey that indicated that while our program was well organized it was a little too much of the same and all about hard work.

Taking on board this feedback during the second half year we have varied the types of speakers, engaged a little more, instigated a few social events separate from the regular meeting nights and also attempted to have some meeting nights more social than serious business. There have been some great festive occasions held on meeting nights too.

Examples are the shared meeting with Bendigo Strathdale at the La Trobe University to launch the painting raffle, the Bill Ashman Testimonial dinner, the Past President's night, the ANZAC Centenary Commemorative Dinner and the Foundation Dinner. A large number of barbeques have also been held where one has the opportunity to chat and crack a few jokes with other members while charcoaling a few snags.

Several members did attend the Rotary International Conference in Sydney along with the District Conference in Hobart in March 2015.

Media/Communication

The Club Signpost is still the traditional conveyor of weekly tidings to our members – although the majority does receive it in email format. The high quality of its presentation is due very much to Matthew Scott and has been continued by newly appointed editor in Sue Hawking.

Matthew has also continued to maintain the club website and face book page. It is vital in today's world that these forms of communication are kept up to date. Only too often I have logged onto other rotary club sights to find the information is well out of date. It is important to keep both mediums up to date and to learn from other clubs. For instance the Melbourne Park Club has been able to recruit 15 new members via the use of face book.

The club did buy its own laptop computer and we are gradually getting better at doing presentations using this technology. The next challenge is to be able beam into our meetings reports from members in absentia.

We have received quite a good coverage of club events from our local newspaper and we should be always looking for every opportunity to tell our stories within the community.

Major Project – Lake Eppalock Fishing Classic

It was very disappointing for all those involved given the hard work that went into the planning, but given the seemingly lack of local community support the correct decision was made not to proceed. All I can say to all members we did give it a shot and fell short in the end but if there is nothing ventured nothing is gained.

IFCR Australian Festival of Cricket

Four sides competed and played cricket on four of the six days of the festival. The other days were spent socializing and exploring what Bendigo had to offer.

All who took part had a great week and this was all due to the hard work of my wonderful organizing committee and well supported by our entire club. To top it off the festival made a tidy little profit that will support several club projects.

Membership and Marketing Report

Strategic Approach

The membership committee adopted the following strategic approach in 2014/15:

- 1. Increase membership by attracting new members, and minimizing loss of current members.
- 2. Engage all members as ambassadors and recruiters, who actively promote the club, attract potential members, and contribute to a positive, vibrant club culture.
- 3. Use the Friends forum as a pathway to membership.
- 4. Widely promote the club and its activities and opportunities.
- 5. Participate in relevant District Programs.
- 6. Evaluate performance by monitoring member numbers and demographics.

Member Numbers

The club membership was 36 at the end of the year (a net increase of three), plus one honorary member (Eddie Beer). We inducted six new members (Jim Rinaldi, Sue and Trevor Hawking, Peter Simmons, Merlyn Quaife, Craig Wright), and lost three members (Elaine Harrington passed away, Sam Tayeh became inactive and terminated, and Jim Boyer resigned). We have nine female members, which is consistent with the District average for female membership.

Member age, gender and service statistics are summarized in the following tables. Member age classes are skewed towards the older age brackets, and females are under-represented.

Glenn Madden joined the Friends group, increasing Friends membership to twelve. Five active volunteers have been invited to join the Friends group.

Membership Activities

President Rod, Matthew Scott, Greg Noonan and Bernie Young attended the District Club Survival Workshop at Kew in August 2014, which provided many valuable ideas and interactions.

A club specific, full colour, membership brochure titled "Why Join Rotary" was developed to showcase the benefits of both being a Rotarian generally, and joining our club specifically.

To assist in retaining and building membership, a survey was undertaken inviting club members to identify what they like about the club, what is not working so well, and suggestions to increase member satisfaction. Members were surveyed face to face in small groups to facilitate group discussion. The Board reviewed all comments and determined a range of actions that will contribute to continuous improvement in member satisfaction and club effectiveness. Club Service Director Tony Plant implemented a range of changes and initiatives in response.


The members were also surveyed to identify preferred social activities, which were then implemented under an active social program led by President Rod.




Members promoted the club twice at the Bendigo Market Place to attract new members, with strong female member participation to demonstrate our commitment to membership diversity.

As this will be my 2nd report as a community service Director, you are only as good as your committee and thanks to my outstanding committee we have had another great year. We set goals at the start of year and I can honestly say that we have achieved them all.

BBQ's

Last year 2013-14 we completed 16 BBQ's. This year we have completed 26 BBQ's and made a profit of over \$13,500. This includes our Australia Day and Easter BBQ's. We couldn't achieve this outstanding effort without the dedicated assistance of Bernie Young and Gary Pinner and of course all members and Friends of our Rotary Club.

Bendigo Swap Meet

This project was a big commitment over a 3-day weekend, and was supported well by our Club. Public attendance was a little down from last year, but with 7 Rotary Clubs involved we all shared a Profit of \$4200.

A big thank you to our Club Members for your commitment and also to the partnering of not for profit organizations being – The Women of Note, Bendigo Chorale, East Loddon P12 School and Men's Sheds Bendigo.

Christmas Cakes, Puddings & Panforts

Thank you to all Rotarians who went out to the community clubs and various businesses to sell cakes, puddings and panforts. This year we sold all stock, selling 1288 items.

A big thank you to Terry Dalwood and George Ellis for running this activity.

Adopt a Highway

This was our 16th year and involved collecting rubbish from both sides of the McIvor Highway for 5 kms, starting from Axedale Township heading towards

Bendigo. This activity takes place on Sunday twice a year. This project is under the direction of Vic Roads.

This year we have introduced a special award for this project judged by our President and the recipient must have found a particular item from the roadside that can be added to the Trophy. Our Club should be proud to start such an activity and a Club Member who will receive this award must hold the Trophy for 12 months and then happily pass it on with a smile.

Relay for Life

This project was our 16th Relay and run in conjunction with the Rotary Club Next Generation, with Leesa Bice (Captain) and Jody Bice organizing this event. This was well supported by RC of Next Generation and some of our members despite of the rain and thunder. Breakfast was run by Rotary and is always well supported.

Camp Getaway

Camp Getaway in Axedale is still progressing with many Rotary Clubs assisting the expansion of the Camp, and at the moment a new kitchen is being built.

Australia Day BBQ

Foundation Report

The Rotary Club of Bendigo South held its second successful Goldfields Cluster Foundation Dinner in November. Assistant District Governors Grant Hocking and Greg Noonan invited Rotarians, partners and guests to attend. Rotary Peace Scholar Alumnus Charles Allen, currently Superintendent of the Priority Communities Division, Victoria Police was joined on stage by Russell Patten, Inspector of Centre for People Development, Victoria Police and talked about the challenges of maintaining law and order in Greater Dandenong where 62% of the municipality are of ethnic descent. Approximately 140 Rotarians and guests attended the dinner with our Club contributing 16. All 9 cluster clubs agreed to cancel their regular meetings and the Bendigo Stadium donated 50% of the meal costs to Rotary. Congratulations to our Secretary Mark Mott who was inducted into the Paul Harris Society.

The Club organized a Past Presidents Night Dinner commemorating 110 years of Rotary in honour of our past presidents and our founding member and past president Bill Ashman. 30 past presidents, 40 current members and District Governor Elect Julie Mason attended the dinner. All the members and guests had much fun and fellowship. Anne Peace organized the raffle, which helped raise funds for the Junortoun Fire Brigade.

An educational program during the year featured our very own Rotarian Anne Peace educating our members on the important work that the Rotary Foundation carries out each year. Anne gave an interesting, informative and heart felt historical account of the Rotary Foundation and its goals during Foundation Month. In 1917 Rotary International President Arch Klumph proposed an endowment fund, which was renamed the Rotary Foundation in 1928, and has grown from initial contributions of \$26.50 to contributions now approaching \$1 billion.

During Foundation Month, we had the privilege of listening to guest speaker and Rotarian David Abbey from the Rotary Club of Shepparton speak about the life of his late father Past President of Rotary International Royce Abbey and of his contribution to Rotary and the Royce and Jean Abbey Foundation Endowed Fund, which was established as part of the Rotary Foundation.

Since 2004, the Royce Abbey Awards have been presented annually to Rotarians who show enthusiasm and commitment to Rotary.

"Every Rotarian Every Year" is an important program that allows Rotarians to donate to the Rotary Foundation. The Centurion Program allows Rotarians in Australia to start the process of personal giving without having to mortgage the house. It is simply a commitment to contribute a minimum of \$100 Australian a year for as long as you choose. Our Club has a goal of achieving 60% member participation. This year we were able to increase our participation by one additional member.

International Service Report

La Trobe University Scholarships

A raffle of a valuable painting was conducted and a net profit = \$3635 was realized. The raffle launch,

with a talk on the endangered Leadbeaters Possum, was a spectacular success thus getting the raffle off to a great start. Support from some secondary colleges was of great assistance while the club also made a sizeable contribution. From the money raised, 2 bursaries in Health Sciences @\$1000 each, were provided to La Trobe University, Bendigo. Thus \$2000 was allocated for 2015, with another \$2000 planned for 2016. Further years will be at the Board's discretion.

It has been agreed that this initiative will be taken over by Vocational Service going into the new rotary year.

Multi-Cultural Relationship and Support

Our support for the Loddon Campaspe Multi-Cultural Service (LCMS) continued throughout the year. Ros Chenery was heroic in organizing the dinner dance at the All Seasons on 21 March 2015. The silent auction was a feature and it raised the sum of \$1170.

A cheque for \$500 was recently presented to Cora Fuentes-Mahnic representing LCMS.

Further, a donation to the Nepal disaster was given -\$1700. (This was transferred through Disaster Aid Australia – see next item).

Our role in further supporting LCMS is to be reviewed.

Disaster Aid Australia

The Club continues to support Disaster Aid Australia.

A general donation of \$1100 was made recently to Disaster Aid. Thus the total donation to Disaster Aid Australia was \$1700 plus \$1100 = \$2800.

We plan to invite a speaker from Disaster Aid to address a Club meeting.

ROMAC

ROMAC – Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children, is a project we have supported for some time. It is a very worthwhile project in that the money raised provides the best medical and surgical expertise, which can transform a child's life. We donated \$500.

MEC

MEC is a life threatening condition that afflicts many children and young adults in Cambodia. The medical name is Meningoencephalocoele. The money raised provides for the necessary facio-cranial operations. We donated \$800 (funds one operation) through the Rotary Club of Bendigo Strathdale.

ACCT

ACCT – Australian Cambodian Children's Taskforce. We made a donation of \$720 to this project.

MUSKAAN

This project supports teaching in the slum areas of Bhopal, India. Marion and Kevin Hardingham from the Rotary Club of Eltham are the contacts.

A budget for donating to this project has yet to be prepared.

WORLD OF DIFFERENCE

This is a project which sponsors a child in Cambodia.

Matthew Scott went to Cambodia and participated in this program - \$500 was allocated towards his attendance from a previously existing International Account. This is a RAWCS District 9800 project.

SISTER ROTARY CLUB IN PHILIPPINES

Consideration for establishing a connection to a Rotary Club in the Philippines has been ongoing.

With our member, Cora Fuentes-Mahnic being in constant contact with people in her homeland, particularly with residents living in the Southern Philippines, where her family resides, we have an opportunity to explore possible links to a Rotary Club in this area. Cora has recently been in the Philippines to undertake this exploration.

Relevant data which needs to be established will include the following initially:

- 1. Name of Rotary Club and Rotary District.
- 2. Names and contact details for office bearers particularly the President and Secretary and any other relevant people.
- 3. Types of projects in which we could have a mutual interest. Further information may need to be forthcoming in due course.

If areas of mutual interest/projects are identified, then modes of liaison, funding, use of third parties etc. would need to be formulated.

There will be Rotary guidelines which need to be followed in establishing a sister club relationship.

Finally I would like to thank the members of the committee for their energetic and at time heroic efforts during the Rotary year. I feel we can be very proud of our achievements.

After more than forty years, recognition as a Paul Harris Fellow remains a respected and prestigious honour for Rotarians and non-Rotarians alike.
