Roxanne Lyon is with the Caregiver Services team within the Home Based Care (Foster Care) program at Anglicare Victoria in Bendigo.

Currently Victoria is experiencing a state wide foster care crisis, with a significant shortage of foster carers, particularly those who are able to support long term placements for children of all ages needing care.

Our team is aiming to raise awareness and generate conversations within the local community about the urgent need for foster carers in our region and state wide. We will be sharing statistics on our current needs and availability, as well as information about what role a foster carer plays and how to become a foster carer with our agency.

These bags will be transported to a Woolstore in Bendigo East along with several others stored elsewhere to be pressed into Wool packs in readiness for a shipment to Dilli then onto Maubisse. We envisage there will be enough items to fill 4 bales and these will then we will load them onto our utes and trailers and take them to Lyndon Fazzo in Mc Dowell's Road who very generously trucks them down to West Footscray to DIK. Both Fazzo 's and the Woolstore assist us and have done SO for many years at no cost to the project. We also have additional storage provided by Bendigo Sandhurst Rotarian in John Cannon at no cost when we need to hold the overflow of goods from the Rotary Shed. Knitted items are sent by groups and individuals from all parts of Victoria and some from places in New South Wales. The very large families at Maubisse look forward to the arrival of the items and every thing sent is put to good use.
