David recently sent me a written summary of the things he talked to us about as well as providing us with a bit of Australian poetry. Given that we have just had **Men's Health Week** and the fact David mentioned in his talk his involvement with an organization known as the Riverina Blue bells I thought I would provide his information to you all via this week's Signpost.

About the Wollundry RC.

- The 2019 year we distributed \$208K to charities, communities, and Youth programmes
- This year we lost one of our major fund raisers which will deplete our community fund by about \$60K
- From our accumulated funds we distributed \$15K to Tumbarumba Rotary Club for help to those badly affected by the recent bushfires
- We have adopted the new constitution in accordance with RI guidelines
- We are planning our annual Gears & Beers for the long weekend in October. Last year we had 3000 riders in various events including a very popular "dirty 130"
- We have had seven Zoom meetings and our first face to face meeting will be our changeover on June 30

Rural Outreach Counselling (ROC)

Rural Outreach Counselling (ROC) is a charitable mental health support service available to people of all ages in rural and remote New South Wales. The strength behind Rural Outreach Counselling Inc is that mental health is everybody's business by providing Mate Keepers and Counsellors to support local people.

- **1. Helping** people with mental health problems earlier, thereby avoiding harmful individual and social impacts
- **2. Fostering** a culture of community support and service delivery that is based on acceptance, respect and the chance to achieve individual wellbeing and personal goals
- **3. Providing** easier access to the most effective treatments, be it in a public mental health service, a ROC Counsellor or another professional service, before people become acutely unwell or go into crisis
- **4. Reaching out** with longer term, holistic support to sustain people in the community, drawing on all relevant health and community services.

The ROC Mate Keeper and Counselling program aspiration is to be an active participant in creating a more cohesive response to mental health that addresses the overall needs of an individual and is not constrained by barriers between providers. Our vision is a mental health strategy that embraces the roles of many sectors and services across the community and the whole-of-government, emphasising that mental health is everyone's business

Through the Mate Keeper Program proactive volunteer members of rural and remote communities are encouraged and supported in a manner that enables ordinary people to help themselves and others. The ROC enabling process, which raises self-confidence, and revolves around increasing awareness in the wider community of the strengths and positive strategies of lived experience that lies with the members of their own community. Through Mate Keeper development the pathways and access points to trusted and accredited sources of information and mental health service provision are made visible at a local level and are made available to the whole of community via the Mate Keeper.

The ROC Mate Keeper Program promotes practical options and strategies that empower recognised and trusted individuals in rural communities to connect and reach out proactively to those struggling with poor mental wellbeing. Through strategic guidance and connection, the Mate Keeper Program enhances resilience and builds mentally healthy rural communities. Mate Keepers, ROC counsellors and networking provide individuals, their families and the community with visible, accessible pathways to support and professional help.

The benefits of the ROC Mate Keeper Program are all encompassing. The connections, the reaching out, relationships formed and the networking via ROC and the Program enable and empower individuals, families and communities to address mental health challenges early and so prevent crisis or suicide.
