

- Food Share coordinated by the magnificent Merlyn was a regular volunteering opportunity, bringing tremendous and much needed support to those most vulnerable and effected by the pandemic.
- Annie North gardening, working bees and donation of essentials brought much needed and appreciated service, support and dignity to women and children escaping violence. Many thanks to all of the members who donated their time, money, energies and items to these initiatives.

With the gradual easing of COVID restrictions the club was able to return to regular dinner meetings at a new venue-The Boat Shed at the Lake View Hotel. At this venue for the first time in my 20 plus years as a Rotary member we are able to order meals from the full menu. This enables a wide choice to cater for all dietary needs and lots of different pricing options to accommodate individual budgets. Also a big plus is that the hotel management allow for some flexibility on our irregular numbers, meaning that one member is not burdened with the most unpopular task of doing a head count prior to each meeting. The tradeoff is we do need to have our guest speaker on first to enable the hotel kitchen the time to prepare the variety of main courses. Given our improved average attendances in recent times as compared to what was happening at our last two meeting venues, it could be said this new arrangement has more pluses than minuses and seems to be popular with the majority of members who regularly attend weekly meetings.

The need for Zoom meetings is no longer required on a regular basis but the club has retained a zoom account which is still very useful for small sub-committee catch ups and has also been useful where we use it to bring into our dinner meeting an overseas visitor or a Rotary member outside our community. Our venue does also enable us to make use of audio visual technology.

The Signpost has continued throughout the year, including our regular features of keeping our members up to date with what is happening in our Rotary Club, also the District 9800, and occasionally what was going on in the world. The Signpost was listed weekly on our Website for all to see, and we had the occasional post on Facebook.

At the commencement of the Rotary year our membership numbers were 43- one of our best returns for many years. Coming off quite an inactive year due to COVID restrictions it was inevitable a loss of members due to minimal engagement could occur. Departing members were Tom Campbell, Richard Epskamp, Jennie Hughes, Kylee McCalman, Kay McLaughlin, Andrew Palmer and Helen Steele. All of these parting members had made a valuable contribution to Rotary International within their time as Rotarians and we thank them for their contribution while members of our club. We welcomed two new members, firstly in Margaret Kelly, a past member of the Rotary Club of Kyneton, and new member to Rotary International in Dorje Tsering. If things go according to plan we will welcome two new additions to our club in former member Craig Wright along with Michelle Newman who has also been a Rotary member in Mount Isa.

International Committee Report

Timor Leste

- Scholarships in Maubisse for 4 girls either in year 10, 11 or 12.
- Restructure of Knitting project for young children in Timor Leste
 - Libby Hughes from Bendigo Club has taken on the coordinator's role. Several lots of Wool Bales have been sent overseas last year.

Cambodia

- MEC this project has sadly wound up.
- DSO
 - o Initially known at Developing Skills Organisation, a name change has been ratified to Developing Schools Organisation which will allow our club to support any school projects in Cambodia. Funds raised from our recent Wine & Cheese afternoon will now go to buying bikes @ US\$50 each for a second-hand Japanese bike which also includes 1 front basket, 1 helmet, and 1 lock, 1 front light & 1 stand for poor children to pedal to school. The Rotary Club of Phnom Penh are our partners who will purchase and distribute the bikes plus organize the libraries on our behalf
 - Currently the RC Phnom Penh has a request for 20 bikes and the remaining funds will be allocated to libraries @ a cost of around \$600 each plus for an extra \$59 it will provide books for kinder children
 - Greg has kindly put in for a District grant application for our bike and library project which would take our funds from \$2,000 {wine & cheese event} to \$3,000. I.e. District would contribute \$1,000. For this Rotary year all District Grant money has been exhausted, but they will release funds in the new Rotary year for our worthwhile project

Urgent Food Aid

 Further funds have been sent to Cambodia to purchase food parcels for needy families and the RC Phnom Penh distribute our packages. The club has no financial commitment, but we support Greg Penno as the project manager for this worthwhile cause.

Natalia project

 A RAWCS account was sent up to bring Natalia to Australia for corrective surgery for a disfiguring facial condition which took place prior to the outbreak of the Covid pandemic. \$16,000 remains in this account for corrective leg surgery. Project Manager Greg Penno stated he has met with an Orthopedic Surgeon who has agreed to perform the surgery for gratis at St Vincent's hospital Melbourne who are also waving their fees so this humanitarian surgery can be undertaken. Greg is now waiting to hear when Natalia can come to Melbourne for a medical consultation & +/- surgery to her leg. The family 1st organisation will accommodate Natalia at their property near Kilmore with Rotary providing her transport.

 The club has no financial responsibility for this project, but Greg Penno is the Manager for this project

Freight support for a container to be sent from DIK (Donation in Kind) to a recipient country in the Pacific area or PNG

• Due to the effects of the Covid pandemic, fundraising to send container of requested items to poor countries have been curtailed. Therefore, DIK have requested each club in District 9800, donate \$500 if possible and this money will be combined with other clubs to help meet the shipping costs. At our May Board Meeting our club decided to donate \$500 and requested our money be allocated to freighting a container to Timor Leste if possible

During the Rotary year this committee, or working elements have met on five occasions. The following has been achieved:

- The Club has remained operational during the COVID period of both Paul and Merlyn's Presidential year. We have emerged post COVID into face to face meetings at our new venue the Lake View Hotel and the Club has successfully transitioned from the Bendigo Tennis Centre into its new venue. Youth Services

Scholarship winners:

Recently all our Secondary Scholarship winners attended and spoke at two club meetings. All the recipients spoke very well and impressed as motivated and passionate young adults. Despite the best efforts of club members, there has been little progress in getting our Latrobe and TAFE winners finalised/coming to speak.

Cluster Youth Directors Meetings:

The group comprising the Bendigo Clubs (and now Rochester) has met twice this year. A number of issues were discussed and the group has decided to follow up on pursuing funding to purchase some E pens for district schools. These devices 'read the words' to students and would be invaluable for those experiencing difficulties with their literacy. District Clubs continue to provide additional support for students in need (e.g. to attend camps)

- A RYPEN camp was held in March in Malmsbury with reasonable numbers
 (about 20) considering that the" COVID hangover" is still having an impact. Very
 positive feedback was received for Weerona College who have not participated
 in this event for a few years. The next camp is in November and the group is
 exploring ways to further promote the event.
- Work is being done to try and increase numbers and interest in future RYLA events. It is costly, and this restricts numbers. A tentative date has been set for November.
- NYSF applications are open and schools are generating interest. CMC have confirmed their interest and I am aware that BSSC is actively promoting the event. A small number of students participated in on-line activities in January.
- Youth Exchange none in 21/22 due to COVID.
- SANTOS some discussion and planning started for upcoming event.

- Science and Engineering Challenge Rod Spitty and his team continue to drive this initiative. Hopefully the event will go ahead with solid numbers. Rod has been asked to send some additional promotional material to district clubs.
- MUNA (Model United Nations Debating Competition) the timeline for getting interest from schools was impacted by the Term 1 holidays. Maybe look at 2023 competition.

General Promotion:

Regular updates on Youth events have been included in the RCBS "Signpost". We need to ensure this continues as schools and other organisations begin to emerge from the COVID 'cocoon'.

We also need to be mindful that there is still some hesitancy from parents in allowing their students to attend some of these events. (For example, numbers at school Year Level camps have been low due to COVID fears, increased costs and the need for regular testing).

The stop- start 2021 – 22 Covid affected year has been an improvement on the previous Rotary year but still has impacted on fundraising income. The BBQ's have continued to be the main source of income with an estimated \$5,000.00 income into our projects account from 18 events over the year. This equates to approximately 300 volunteer hours for our club's members and friends' involvement.

Notable cancellations include Latrobe Uni Open Day, Bendigo Dog Obedience Trials, Tafe Inclusion Day, Relay for Life, MS Walkathon, White Night Bendigo, Swap Meet Catering, Red Ribbon Rebellion, Australia Day and Scott's Day Out. Pre-Covid interruptions we would normally expect involvement in 25 – 30 events raising in excess of \$25,000.00 and totaling 1,000 plus volunteer hours. Hoping the next Rotary year will see a more normal Covid free year.

This Rotary year we have had the opportunity to purchase a mobile cool room trailer which should produce income through hire, and will be a great asset on our larger BBQ's. Thanks to George Ellis for his fantastic work co- coordinating all the volunteers for the events and to everyone who has volunteered to help run the events that we could.

Looking ahead to the next Rotary year plans are well in place for the Welsh Choir concert, Swap Meet Catering, Christmas Trailer Raffle and Australia Day. So, as you can see, we have many activities and Community involvement planned for the 2022 – 23 Rotary year.

Congratulations to President Merlyn on what has been a very challenging but rewarding year and we look forward to continue to be working with you again to achieve great things.

During the last 12 months the project committee have been planning for two major events in the 2021/2022 rotary year. These were:

- Science & Engineering Challenge Regional Event 23rd August, 2021 to be held at Girton Grammar Stadium.
- Science & Engineering National Final 28/29th October, 2021 to be held at Bendigo South East College Stadium.

The successful implementation for both events was COVID dependent.

The club has been undertaking the annual regional event for 16 years and last hosted the National final in 2009.

A special thank you to all committee members for their dedication, hard work and support to this project which is aimed at developing science & engineering commitment to year 10 students so as to study and undertake a career in these demanding and expanding disciplines and to assist in the skills base deficiency in Central Victoria and Regional Australia.

Thank you to our extensive industry and community partnerships for their ongoing commitment over the years in what is a difficult and challenging project to implement in these current times. Over the last 12 months the COVID situation nationally and locally forced Newcastle University to cancel all events, therefore our scheduled events did not take place. Both events were to be re- scheduled for some time in 2022 depending on the COVID situation. The project committee had no alternative but to put all its planning and partnerships on hold.

In early 2022 Newcastle University set new dates. These are:

- Regional Event 22nd August to be held at Bendigo South East College Stadium
- National Final 20/21st October to be held at Bendigo South East College Stadium

Each event will involve participation of 250 year 10 students with all activities supervised by La Trobe University final year students and undertaken by Newcastle University. The budget for the Regional event is \$10,000 and 8 schools have registered. The budget for the National event is \$15,000 and will involve the 8 top schools throughout Australia competing.

Three problems have emerged:

- Changes in sponsorship have led to increased costs
- COVID requirements of the day and the Victorian Education Department must be complied with.
- Specific sponsor partnership requirements have changed due to changing individual circumstances.

All these matters are being managed with difficulty by the project committee.

During the year Tom Glazebrook stepped down from the project committee. On behalf of the Rotary Club of Bendigo South and the project committee I wish to thank Tom for many years of continuous service.

All being well both the Regional Event and the National Final will take place in 2022 as scheduled.

In Australia and New Zealand it has become a tradition that a club may determine to recognise a Club Member or community member as a Paul Harris Fellow for meritorious service, where the club contributes US\$1,000.00 to the Rotary Foundation from club funds. Recognition as a Paul Harris Fellow remains a respected and prestigious honour for Rotarians and non-Rotarians alike.
